

Bishop Dun Retires in Washington

WASHINGTON, May 6 — The Right Rev. Angus Dun retired today as Bishop of the Protestant Diocese of Washington.

Bishop Dun was honored at a special service in the Washington Cathedral this afternoon and at a testimonial dinner tonight at the Statler-Hilton Hotel. He was praised for his leadership since 1925 in the ecumenical movement among Christian denominations and for eighteen years of "wisdom, far-reaching vision and hard work" as Bishop of Washington.

At a service of thanksgiving for his episcopate at the Cathedral, Bishop Dun presented his crozier, a symbol of office, to his successor, the Right Rev. William F. Creighton, who has been Bishop Coadjutor of the diocese since 1959.

Bishop Dun was 70 years old last Friday.

here in April, 1944, said in his sermon today that Bishop Dun had made a "contribution in depth" to the unity of Christian churches.
