

DR. SLATTERY TO WED BISHOP'S DAUGHTER

Bishop Coadjutor of Massachusetts Engaged to Miss Sarah Lawrence.

HE IS A BACHELOR NEAR 56

His Fiancee a Former Trustee of Wellesley — He Wrote Grace Church Friends of His Troth.

BOSTON, Nov. 5.—The engagement of Miss Sarah Lawrence, daughter of Bishop and Mrs. William Lawrence, to Bishop Coadjutor Charles L. Slattery of the Massachusetts Episcopal Diocese was announced today.

Miss Lawrence is a former trustee of Wellesley College and a graduate of the Simmons School of Social Work. During the war she worked in the Boston Chapter of the American Red Cross. Bishop Slattery is a native of Pittsburgh, Pa., and a graduate of the Episcopal Theological School, Cambridge. He was called to Grace Church, New York, in 1910, where he remained until called to Boston as Bishop Coadjutor a year ago.

The news of the engagement of the Right Rev. Charles Lewis Slattery, Coadjutor Bishop of the Episcopal Diocese of Massachusetts, to Miss Sarah Lawrence, daughter of the Right Rev. William Lawrence, Bishop of Massachusetts, and Mrs. Lawrence, was received in this city with deep interest, surprise and great pleasure. Especially was this so at Grace Episcopal Church, Broadway and Tenth Street, where Dr. Slattery was rector for the twelve years before he was elected to the episcopate a year ago.

The Rev. Dr. W. Russell Bowie, Bishop Slattery's successor at Grace Church, received a letter from Dr. Slattery shortly before the public announcement, telling the news. A letter giving the same fact was received by each vestryman of Grace Church, and also by many other personal friends of the Bishop.

It had been believed quite generally in Episcopal circles here that Dr. Slattery was "a confirmed bachelor." On Dec. 9 next he will be 56 years old. His mother lived with him and kept house for him at the Grace Church rectory until her death in March, 1921. Bishop Slattery and a son, who lives in Denver, Col., were her only children, and she had been a widow since their childhood. When Dr. Slattery, the Rev. Dr. William T. Manning and the Rev. Dr. Ernest M. Stires were all being urged by their respective friends for Bishop of New York, one of the arguments used against Dr. Slattery was that it was better to have a Bishop who had a wife.

Miss Lawrence is known at Grace Church. She has attended there now and then with her brother-in-law and sister, Mr. and Mrs. Morton L. Fearey, who were parishioners until a few years ago, when they moved from New York to Garden City, L. I.

Bishop Lawrence has been a visiting preacher at Grace Church for many years.

PHILIPS BROTHERS TO WED.

MRS. CARUSO TO WED SOON.

Her Engagement to Capt. Ingram Formally Announced by Her Sister.

Formal announcement of the engagement of Mrs. Dorothy Benjamin Caruso, widow of the famous tenor, to Captain Ernest A. Ingram of London was made yesterday by Mr. and Mrs. Frederick Worth Goddard of 1,100 Park Avenue. Mrs. Goddard is Mrs. Caruso's sister. This confirmed an announcement which came from Paris last Saturday. Mrs. Goddard said that the marriage is to take place in Paris the middle of this month.

Captain Ingram, who is an Englishman, 32 years old, served in the West Yorkshire Infantry and was seriously wounded in the first battle of Somme. Later he was attached to Lord Weir's staff in the air force, and finally served on the British Aviation Committee in Paris. He is an engineer by profession. Mrs. Goddard said that her sister met the Captain at Lake Como last summer while she was visiting friends there, and further said that both she and her husband heartily approved of the match, as they had felt that Mrs. Caruso needed some one to protect her and little Gloria. After the wedding the couple plan to take an apartment in Paris, where they will probably remain for the winter.
