## May Flowers

Most of us know the old adage, “April showers bring May flowers.” Perhaps we could look at this old adage in a whole new way. Perhaps “flowers” could be taken as a verb rather than a noun. As Webster’s defines it “to flower— means to bloom, to come to prime condition”. May flowers—it is the month of May that all of nature around us produces and comes into its prime condition as evidence by the vast array of color and hue. How fitting it is that all of the Sundays of May are included within Eastertide. Peter Moore, the present seminary dean of Trinity Episcopal School for Ministry, will offer various programs throughout the Summer in several geographies oriented towards either middle school or upper school youth. While Young Life focuses mostly on public schools, FOCUS is more geared toward students in independent schools. (Look for Young Life Summer offerings elsewhere in this X-Press.) FOCUS summer programs are described below. You can visit their website at [www.infocus.org](http://www.infocus.org) or telephone (434) 245-6112 for more information. Note: program costs do **not** include cost of transportation to/from the location. Hard as it is to believe, some of these programs are **already** full (but wait-listing is possible). Financial aid is available (see the website or telephone). Plan your summer now!

**June Week II: June 19-26, Grades 9-12, Cost \$415, Status: program open**  
Pure fun and a chance to explore the activities Martha's Vineyard has to offer. Enjoy afternoons of beach trips, sailing, tennis, basketball, volleyball, and summer relaxation. Talks and discussions center on the basis for Christian belief

**Island Cruise: June 15 – 21, Grades 7-8, Cost \$655, Status: program full / waitlist**  
Five days aboard the 120-foot topsail schooner *Shenandoah*, on the waters of southern New England. Experience the power and beauty of a ship under sail, as well as unforgettable fun. (Note: The *Shenandoah* is neither owned nor operated by FOCUS; the program is run by FOCUS staff and volunteers.)

# Readings for June

## Sunday, June 1 – The Seventh Sunday of Easter

First Lesson: Acts 1: 15-26

The sense of unity within the fellowship of Jesus' disciples was reflected in the period between his ascension and the Day of Pentecost.

Second Lesson: I John 5: 9-15

The reading from I John also reflects the theme of unity between Jesus and the Father, and between Jesus and us.

The Gospel: John 17: 11b-19

Today's Gospel reading is a portion of Jesus' prayer for his disciples on the night before he died. In that prayer, he asks the Father to unite us with him.

## Sunday, June 8 – The Day of Pentecost

First Lesson: Acts 2: 1-11

In the reading from Acts, we hear the account of the first Pentecost Day, when the apostles received the Spirit and proclaimed the gospel in many tongues.

Second Lesson: I Corinthians 12: 4-13

The second reading, from I Corinthians, describes the work of God's Spirit in the church.

The Gospel: John 14: 8-17

In the Gospel reading today, Jesus, before his crucifixion, assures the disciples that his followers will continue the work of the Gospel after his departure.

## Sunday, June 15 – The First Sunday after Pentecost: Trinity Sunday

First Lesson: Exodus 3: 1-6

The first reading today is the account of God's meeting with Moses in the wilderness at the mountain of God.

Second Lesson: Romans 8: 12-17

The second reading is from Paul's Epistle to the Romans. This passage explores the ways the Persons of the Trinity relate to us.

The Gospel: John 3: 1-16

The Gospel reading today is Jesus' encounter with Nicodemus and the evangelist's discussion of the meaning of Jesus' words.

## Sunday, June 22 – The Second Sunday after Pentecost

First Lesson: Job 38: 1-11, 16-18

In the Old Testament book of Job, God responds to Job's questioning by asking how Job dare think himself competent, as a creature, to question the Creator.

Second Lesson: II Corinthians 5: 14-21

We continue to read through II Corinthians with Paul's testimony to the salvation effected for all people in the dying and rising of Jesus.

The Gospel: Mark 4: 35 – 5: 20

Our theme today is Jesus' lordship over the natural world and over the forces of evil in the universe.

## Sunday, June 29 – The Third Sunday after Pentecost

First Lesson: Deuteronomy 15: 7-11

In the first reading, from Deuteronomy, the basic principle of our responsibility to God for those who are outcast and poor is stated. This principle underlies all Judeo-Christian social ethics.

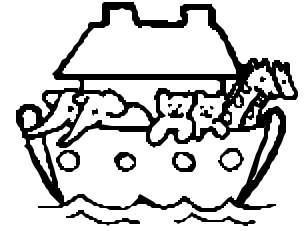
Second Lesson: II Corinthians 8: 1-9, 13-15

Paul restates this principle in today's reading from II Corinthians. Paul calls on the Corinthians to emulate the generosity of the churches in Macedonia in contributing to a collection to aid less fortunate Christians.

The Gospel: Mark 5: 2-24, 35b-43

Today's liturgy directs our attention to God's care for the poor and unfortunate. In the Gospel reading we hear the account of Jesus' raising the young daughter of the Jewish official, Jairus.

## Coming Soon to St. Andrew's Library (in the Peabody Room)...

The books reviewed below will soon be added to the St. Andrew's library located in the Peabody Room.

### A Wind in the Door by Madeleine L'Engle

"There are dragons in the twins' vegetable garden" begins the story of an encounter of Meg Murray, Calvin O'Keefe, and the ailing Charles Wallace with a *singular* cherubim named Proginoskes ("Progo" for short). (The opening sentence ranks up there with other notables such as Charles Williams' *War in Heaven*.) Progo and the children joined by a school principal and a garden snake battle against the evil *Eckthroi* intent upon extinguishing, piece by piece – whether at the galactic level or in the microscopic world of mitochondria and farandolae. L'Engle weaves concepts of naming, communication, interconnectedness, and *agape* love into this riveting story that, once begun, is difficult – if not impossible – to put down.

Recommended for middle school to adult and an excellent book for summer reading.

### The Cloister Walk by Kathleen Norris

Contemporary poet and feminist Kathleen Norris spent 9 months in a few monasteries and wrote *The Cloister Walk* as a result. Raised as a Presbyterian, she moved from New York City with her husband to her maternal grandmother's house in South Dakota (read her prior *Dakota: A Spiritual Geography*), becoming a Benedictine oblate, a lay associate (among other things), somewhere along the way. This book alternates between Norris's reflections on the liturgical calendar (as she experienced it at the monastery) and memoirs of her own past. Her observations are keen: "Maybe Mary's story, and this feast [the Presentation of the Lord], tell us that if the scriptures don't sometimes pierce us like a sword, we're not paying close enough attention"; or this one: "Listening to Jeremiah is one [bleep] of a way to get your blood going in the morning; it puts caffeine to shame." (Be warned that this book, on occasion, contains language that would cause it to be rated PG-17, if it were an American movie.) *Reviewed by Jonathan Wistar.*

### Peculiar Treasures: A Biblical Who's Who by Frederick Buechner

Perhaps Martha Giltinan's favorite contemporary author, Buechner composes 100 (or so) short, insightful and sometimes humorous sketches of Biblical characters, an A-Z if you will, including (at the far end of the spectrum) Jonah's whale (under 'W' of course). Try Gabriel, for example:

She struck the angel Gabriel as hardly old enough to have a child at all, let alone this child, but he'd been entrusted with a message to give her, and he gave it.

He told her what the child was to be named, and who he was to be, and something about the mystery that

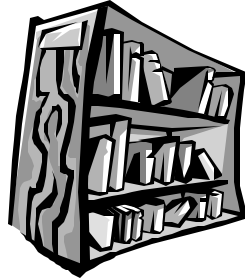

was to come upon her. "You mustn't be afraid, Mary," he said.

As he said it, he only hoped she wouldn't notice that beneath the great, golden wings he himself was trembling with fear to think that the whole future of creation hung now on the answer of a girl.

This is a particularly excellent book, if you only have 5-minute blocks in which to read.

The longest sketches are Job (4 ¼ pages) and Paul (4 ¾ pages). Stimulating so as not to be recommended as bed-time reading! *Reviewed by Jonathan Wistar.*

## The Color of the Day is RED

Please make plans to attend the great celebration of the birthday of the church and the gift of the Holy Spirit on June 8<sup>th</sup>. The feast of Pentecost is celebrated with incense, streamers in the procession (to remind us of a rushing wind) and the color Red. Everyone is encouraged and invited to put on their best red tie, blouse, skirt, pants, jacket or hat. The day of Pentecost is also an appropriate day for baptisms. In place of the Nicene Creed we will reaffirm our baptismal vows, or, God willing, welcome more people into the household of God by celebrating the sacrament of baptism. Please make plans to be at St. Andrew's on June 8<sup>th</sup> and don't forget to wear RED.

## New Parish Hall Steps and New Walkways

Finally, the steps leading into the parish hall are completed. No longer will we have to deal with replacing the concrete steps year after year. No longer will salt and sand reduce the steps to an "enter-at-your-own-risk" entrance. No longer will the snow and ice in combination with salt and sand erode the concrete steps and reduce them to a gravelly mess. Now we have replaced them with sturdy and durable granite, which promises to be in place for years upon years. If you haven't checked out the new steps please do so.

The same contractor who installed our new Parish Hall steps (Jim Moison) is scheduled to begin work on all three entrances into the church. The Peabody and Bell tower walkways will be under construction beginning in the latter part of May and will take several weeks to complete. The Peabody walk, along with the ramp-entrance into the Peabody room, will be laid using durable granite. As a matter of fact, like the Parish Hall steps, all of the entrances will be paved with the same granite pavers. Using the same material with which the actual church is constructed, the walkways will not only be functional and safe but also aesthetically pleasing to the eye. Mr. Moison will also adapt existing granite steps from our current walkways to make our West entrance (Forest street side) much more accessible. Additionally, the steps leading from the front sidewalk will also be replaced as will the wooden platform of the Bell tower entrance. In order to bring focus to and divert traffic into the main entrance of the church, the Bell Tower entrance will receive a seven-post granite and metal handrail leading from the sidewalk into the church, thus creating an inviting and safe front door entryway.
