

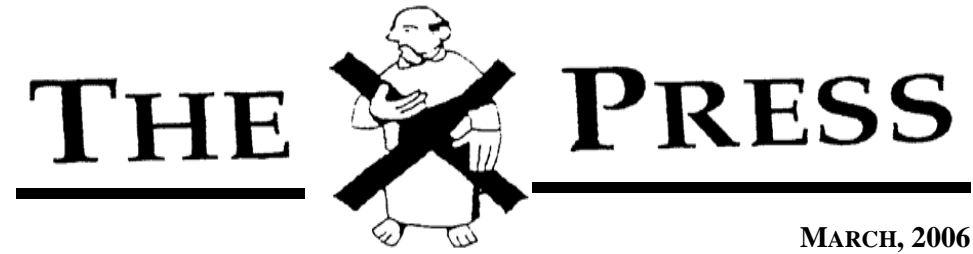

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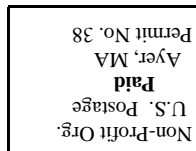


Dear People of St. Andrews,

I am writing this letter while visiting our son and his wife in San Diego. The sun is shining and flowers are in bloom, but I realize that when we get back it will still be a while before we see that happening in New England.

The word LENT for the 40 days preceding Easter beginning on March 1, is an old English word that refers to the “lengthening of days.” Although Lent is a time of fasting, prayer and self-denial, the days will be getting longer, the first signs of spring will appear and the season will be concluded with the rising of the Son of Righteousness on Easter Day. St. Paul in one of his letters to the Corinthians recounts the ministries of God’s people by speaking of a number of hardships that they have gone through to bear witness to the Gospel of Jesus Christ and then he says these words: “As dying and behold we live.” (II Cor. 6:9)

At the very heart of the Christian life is the proclamation of life from death, joy from sorrow and pain, and that God’s victory over evil and triumph over the grave is through the route of the cross. We are called in this holy season to seek a deeper relationship with God through time spent in a more focused way upon Jesus and especially upon his passion and death that are the gateway to his resurrection. Dying to oneself is not a negative term implying that God wants to make our lives miserable but a recognition that to grow in Christ one has to shed over a lifetime selfishness and self-centeredness that can separate us from God, one another and even from our own true selves.

This pilgrim journey is especially focused in Lent when it is hoped that many of us will give added time and attention to what really matters in our consumer culture. The love of God is seen supremely in the Crucified One yielding his life to the Father on our behalf. Personal acts of devotion may include forms of self-denial, the disciplining of our appetites, the extra support of works of mercy and to giving added time to prayer, Bible study and spiritual reading. I have ordered some coin folders which may be used during Lent and returned at Easter, and I have also ordered some daily devotions for Lent by my favorite devotional writer, Henri Nouwen, who I feel has a way of expressing things that cut right to the heart of the matter of being a disciple of Jesus.

We are having a series of Soup Suppers with speakers on various topics on Wednesday evenings, beginning on March 8. We are not covering just one topic but basically three: Healing, the Anglican Communion to which we belong as Episcopalians, and two alternate views on the sexuality issues being debated in the church. I hope that these will be helpful in looking at some of the important concerns and ministries of the church of Christ and help all of us. There is a sign-up sheet for people to offer to bring soup, bread, etc. on the various Wednesday evenings.

There is a continuing Bible study on Monday mornings at 9 led by John Ferrillo and the mid-week Eucharist with healing prayer every Wednesday at 12 noon. There may be other ways we can decide to use to make this a time of reflection and deepening commitment to what it means to be a Christian. The point is: we are all called to make use of this 40-day period of preparation for Easter as a gift from God to help us grow into his likeness, who loves us all and has redeemed us by his sacrifice on the cross.

So, for all of us, may this be a holy Lent.

Devotional Practices

As Anglican Christians with a strong sense of tradition in the use of liturgy and ritual in our worship, there are a number of personal devotional practices that are used by some and not by others. What I mean by that is that there has never been any attempt at conformity by Anglican Christians to make everybody do the same thing in the same way, but in any parish you may find certain practices being observed by some and in some cases most of the congregation, and it is well to understand the meaning and history of these practices whether you personally find them useful or not. So over the next number of newsletters, I am going to mention various ones, beginning with the use of the sign of the cross.

During times of persecution in the early days of the church, Christians often identified themselves to one another by drawing a cross on the ground with a stick or by making the sign of the cross upon themselves with their hands. If this was recognized by the other person and returned, it was safe to identify oneself as a follower of the Way. Persecution was intermittent for over 300 years with imprisonment, loss of employment or even martyrdom being the price of being discovered a Christian.

Among Western Christians, making the sign of the cross became a devotional act accompanying prayer or before and after receiving communion, using the right hand to touch the forehead, the chest, the left shoulder and then the right shoulder. (Among Eastern Christians, it would be the right shoulder first and then the left.) It is meant to be a reminder that we are signed with the seal of the cross, redeemed by the power of the cross and that we plead that power when we pray. Many use the sign of the cross at the mention of the Trinity, before and after prayer, at the end of the Creed and any time they want to for any reason. It is also customary for many to make a small cross on the forehead, the lips and the breast as the Gospel is announced, with a silent prayer, "May the words of the Holy Gospel be in my head, on my lips and in my heart."

Thus this ancient form of devotion continues for many of us to be a physical way of expressing our prayer as well as reminding us of the centrality of the cross in our lives as Christians.

St. Andrew's Historical Note - RECTORY

Once again the rectory is available for rental so we thought it was a good time to give a short history of this fascinating building.

It was designed by Rev. Thomas Legate Fisher, fourth vicar at St. Andrews under the leadership of our first rector Rev. Dr. Endicott Peabody, Headmaster of Groton School. Rev. Fisher took charge of the parish in January, 1900. In one of his historical sketches he wrote, "Originally the property adjoining the church on the east side was covered by a large tenement house long out of repair, occupied by families in close quarters. Through the generosity of Wm. A. Gardner, a master at Groton School, this property was purchased, the old building sold and removed, and a new structure built on the lot, further back from the street, on a line with the church. The house was designed by Mr. Fisher to be the home of the minister and equally the parish house of the people. It has fully demonstrated the utility of the arrangement. It is a charming family house, and its double duty has brought the people and pastor into close touch. It is a mutual benefit to have the people freely and often enter the pastor's living place, and promotes the mutual relation of the parish family." The construction was completed December 1, 1901, and occupied and used Christmas Eve.

Rev. Paul Koumrian, rector of St. A's from 1976-1989, was the last clergyman to live in the rectory. While rector, he decided it would be best for his family to purchase their own home in the town of Harvard, which they did in the early 80's. Since then the Vestry has agreed to let it be rented several times, bringing in much needed income.

In 2005 our very own Vic Burton decided it needed major work to make it attractive to potential renters so he took on the job of overseeing its' renewal. He did an amazing job scheduling the dozens of parish volunteers who willingly removed huge amounts of trash, painted, cleaned windows and floors etc., laid new vinyl flooring, insulated heating pipes, installed new appliances, etc., etc., and did an amazing amount of various problem solving. Vic also arranged for the purchase of the new appliances.

It's now a bright, inviting, four bedroom, two bath home looking for a family to call its' own! The latest tenants rented it for about a year while their home was being built. If you know of someone who'd like to rent it please see Vic Burton, or a vestry member.

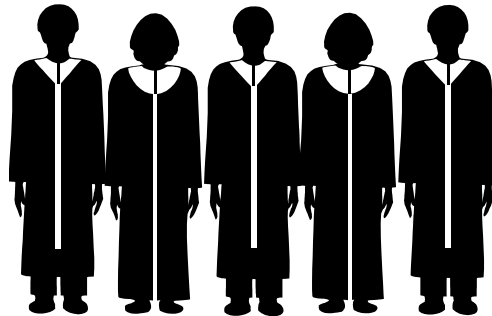

A Letter from the Bishop

FROM BISHOP CEDERHOLM

Epiphany Greetings and Thank You for your support and hard work contacting your legislators to oppose S1074, legislation which would have inappropriately entangled the state in church matters and imposed administrative and financial burdens on all houses of worship in the Commonwealth. This legislation was defeated by a margin of 147-3 on January 25.

The collaborative efforts organized by the Massachusetts Council of Churches among many faith denominations was an extraordinarily unifying experience in which clergy and lay leaders came together in a spirit of mutual respect and joint action to work on an issue of importance to religious liberty for members of all faiths. I commend the Council of Churches for its leadership, preparation and tireless work to bring us all together. This was a watershed event for strengthening ecumenical relations among us.

Vestry Meeting Highlights

Highlights from the January, 2006 Vestry Meeting:

- ✘ Linda Kaferle was introduced as the new Clerk for the coming year. Linda has been a parishioner for a few months and volunteered to be the non-Vestry Clerk. We welcomed her and thanked her for coming forward to help.
- ✘ Father Alan began the meeting by reminding us that today the church celebrates the Confession of Saint Peter. He read from Matthew, Chapter 16, then led us in prayer, including the Lord's Prayer.
- ✘ Rector's Report: Fr. Alan reported there had been a good turnout for both the Christmas Eve services followed by the baptism of Peggy Braat's grandchild on Christmas morning. Father Alan is conducting a Confirmation class for two teens. The youth program has seen two successful activities the past winter, namely meeting for bowling with pizza at the Harvard Lanes and then seeing the movie *The Chronicles of Narnia* in Tyngsborough followed by pizza. Parishioner Randy Clemence has indicated interest in becoming involved with our youth. A decision has been made to change the time of the two youngest church school classes to commence at the same time as the ten o'clock service. Teachers and parents feel this will give them more classroom time as well as shortening the length of fidget time the children have in the church proper. The teen class will continue to meet from 9:15 to 10:00. This information will be announced in the order of service, the X-Press and local newspapers. The change will be in effect on February 12. The new church website was discussed and Father Alan feels it will be attractive and useful to both present parishioners and those searching for an area Episcopal church. Future ideas he has in mind are a Lenten event, an evening Bible study and a ministry of healing. The Lenten event will probably be on March 29 with speakers Jurgen Lias and Ian Douglas. He is anticipating appointment of a new organist soon and if it is the candidate from Groton School, we may have a stronger connection with the School after a lapse of many years. This organist, Michael Smith, will play at Saint Andrew's on January 29.
- ✘ Clerk Nancy Barringer distributed the December minutes which were reviewed and after some discussion were accepted.
- ✘ A motion to nominate Linda Kaferle as Clerk was made, seconded and accepted.
- ✘ Sue Hildreth reported about her work reviewing the past year's finances. She distributed copies of the budget she has been working on and reviewed it with us. Sue said \$12,000.00 has been moved out of our endowment to cover expenses. She is aware that there will be bequests to the church from our late parishioners Bertha Doran and John Riley. Rental of the Parish Hall was dis-

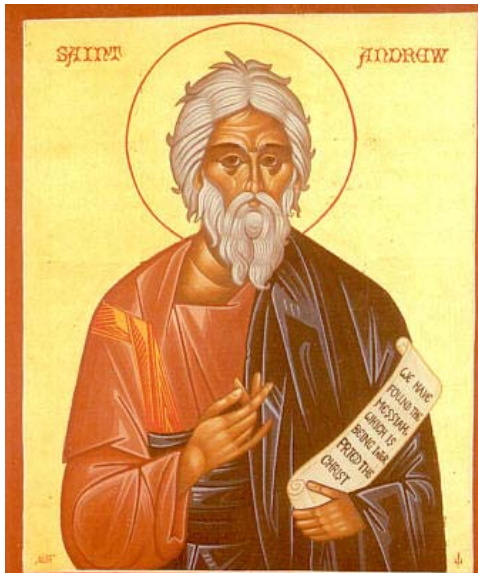

New Parish Historian Appointed

Long-time St. Andrew's member Louise Rogers was appointed Parish Historian by a unanimous vote of the Vestry at their January meeting. Louise succeeds Sarah Hamill, who served as Historian for many years before retiring with her husband Jim to Portsmouth, NH last summer. The position of Parish Historian was mandated at the Diocesan Convention of 1935 (Canon 3, section 4). The Historian is custodian of non-current records of the Vestry and parish commissions, as well as programs, newspaper clippings, and photographs – anything that documents the history of a parish. In addition, the Historian is required to document and report to the Diocese about all memorial gifts (stained glass windows, for example) received by the parish. Thank you Louise for taking on this important responsibility.

Icon of St. Andrew



Some years ago, an icon of our patron St. Andrew was commissioned by Jane Rockwell and done in the traditional “egg tempera” method of icons in the Eastern Orthodox Church. This beautiful icon has been hung on the wall of the Sacristy, hidden from view to most parishioners. It was brought out into the chancel area so that it can be seen and be a focus of respect of the apostle who was the first witness for Jesus, bringing his brother, Peter, to meet him. Now we are attempting to find a good place for this icon so this beautiful piece is available for all to see.

Icons in the Eastern Church have a very mystical meaning and are supposed to be “windows to heaven.” They are not meant to be representational but to help us to draw nearer to the spiritual reality of the person or event depicted.

cussed including use by AA and the other local groups and use by John Ferrillo for his musician’s clinics. Father Alan thinks a “guidebook” for use of the church facilities for weddings and groups should be written and made available to interested parties. The guidelines could also be posted on the website.

- ✘ We are all concerned about the possibility that the Massachusetts State Legislature may pass a law that would require all churches to make their finances more transparent by hiring CPA’s, submitting financial statements, charging fees for administrative changes and generally making it very costly for a small church to run its financial affairs. See today’s Boston Globe. We pray this does not pass.
- ✘ It seems the Diocese requires a Church Historian. With the departure of Sarah Hamill, longtime Saint Andrew’s historian, Louise Rogers has come forward to do the job. We moved, seconded and approved Louise in this position.
- ✘ Next, all the church reports were reviewed. They are: Altar Guild; Building Committee (Alan Rogers wishes to move on); Christian Formation; Communications (X-Press still being printed and mailed after practically no information); Facilities; Investments (report distributed); LEMBs; Membership; Outreach; Parish Life; Pastoral Care (prayer chain needs to be started up again and we need transport for the elderly); Stewardship; Worship (inactive for three years now).
- ✘ Nancy Barringer, in charge of the Nursery, feels an outside person should be hired to replace our graduating student Alice Cassin. She is concerned about safety checks. Erin Pueschel said she has some experience in this and can help.
- ✘ The Vestry retreat will be either March 11, 18 or 25th. Vestry members please communicate best times for them.
- ✘ From February 9 through the 23 Father Alan will be away visiting family in California. Father Ted Lewis will substitute.
- ✘ The Musician’s Search Committee has found four qualified candidates for organist. Auditions will take place February 1 and 5.
- ✘ Diocesan consultant Alden Flanders is trying to set a date so that Trinity Chapel of Shirley and Saint David’s of Pepperell can get together with us to discuss common areas of interest and possible cooperation.
- ✘ The family renting the Rectory is due to move out February 15. Rental ads have been placed to find new renters.
- ✘ Our cleaning contract is up for renewal. It is with PCS, formerly All Seasons cleaning. Former cleaner Nancy Mayo cannot do the work. We are not satisfied with PCS.
